ex) The explanation was clear, and the conclusion drawn therefrom was logical.

2. Stern (adjective) - serious and unrelenting, especially in the expression of disapproval ex) The teacher's stern gaze silenced the noisy classroom.

"If I get too emotional, there will be chaos. Therefore I must be very stern and detached."

3. Flare up (phrasal verb) - to become suddenly angry or intense ex) It's important not to let small disagreements flare up into major conflicts.

"If a partner is out of contact for a while... it means they've abandoned me. Therefore I need to *flare up* at any threat of absence."

4. Insistently (adverb) - in a persistent and demanding manner

ex) She **insistedently** requested a chance to present her ideas to the team.

"We *insistently* layer them onto situations in the here and now that could have had far more benevolent endings."

5. In the here (phrase) - in the present or current situation

ex) Let's focus on resolving the issues in the here and now rather than dwelling on the past.

"We insistently layer them onto situations in the here and now that could have had far more benevolent endings."

6. Benevolent (adjective) - showing kindness and goodwill

ex) The **benevolent** gestures of the volunteers made a significant impact on the community.

"We insistently layer them onto situations in the here and now that could have had far more *benevolent* endinas."

7. Lets somebody down (phrase) - to disappoint or fail to meet someone's expectations ex) I hope I never let my friends down when they rely on me.

"Our partner lets us down in a minor way and, sure this means they are about to destroy us, we start to insult them."

8. Reprimand (noun/verb) - a rebuke, especially an official one; to rebuke or criticize ex) The employee received a **reprimand** for consistently arriving late to work.

"Yes, I made a mistake, but the result doesn't have to be cruel *reprimand*."



2. Listening Drill

"Unfortunately for everyone, we seem to go around the world with scripts in our minds. A script is a *collection of expectations* about how events will unfold and how we should best respond to them - built up out of the worst moments of our childhoods and our most immature and frightened deductions therefrom.

Here are some representative scripts: When I make a mistake... I will get shouted at uncontrollably. Therefore I must never admit I'm at fault. Or when I trust someone... they betray me. Therefore I must never open up. Or if I get too emotional, there will be chaos. Therefore I must be <u>very stern</u> and detached. Or if a partner is out of contact for a while... this means they've abandoned me. Therefore I need to flare up at any threat of absence.

These scripts tell us a lot about our pasts, but the tragedy is that, unaware they exist, we let them determine our futures. We insistently *layer them onto situations* in the here and now that could have had far more benevolent endings.

A boss very gently points out a mistake and, out of a fear that this is a prelude to relentless humiliation, <u>we snap back</u>. Our partner lets us down in a minor way and, sure this means they are about to destroy us, we start to insult them.

The solution is to recognize that there can be different endings. Yes, I made a mistake, but the result doesn't have to be cruel reprimand. Yes, the partner let me down, but they can - and do - still love me very much. I could get annoyed, but the emotion doesn't have to escalate uncontrollably.

In other words, what happened originally <u>doesn't have to keep happening</u>. But only if we can first understand what actually happened. And to help us with this, we should explore the past by completing the following sentences: When I make a mistake..., When I trust someone..., If I get too emotional..., If a partner has to be out of touch for a while... The end goal of maturity might be defined as the ability to approach as much of life as possible life without a script."



Between 2022 and 2023, conversations around middle age saw a 2,402 increase on Instagram. Agerelated conversations which included the proverb "a rolling stone gathers no moss" saw increases on Facebook of 386 percent year on year, whilst discussions including the topic of Bodhipakkhiyādhammā, the qualities conducive to awakening, saw a 271 percent increase on the platform.

These expressions and idioms can **be used when describing various trends**, **changes**, **or patterns** in charts, graphs, or data presentations.

- 1. **Shoot up** (phrasal verb) - to increase rapidly and sharply ex) The sales figures for the new product **shot up** after the marketing campaign. 2. Plummet (verb) - to fall or decline steeply ex) The stock prices **plummeted** after the negative news was released. Level off (phrasal verb) - to stabilize or reach a steady state 3. ex) After a period of growth, the demand for the product leveled off. Skyrocket (verb) - to increase dramatically and quickl. 4. ex) The company's profits skyrocketed after the successful launch of their new product. 5. Plateau (noun) - a period of stability or little change ex) The revenue growth reached a plateau and remained steady for several months. Fluctuate (verb) - to rise and fall irregularly or unpredictably 6. ex) The stock prices fluctuated throughout the day, responding to market conditions. 7. Bottom out (phrasal verb) - to reach the lowest point and then stabilize ex) The housing prices finally bottomed out and showed signs of recovery. Surge (verb) - to experience a sudden and significant increase 8. ex) The website experienced a surge in traffic after being featured in a popular blog. 9. Slump (noun) - a sudden and significant decline or decrease ex) The company's profits suffered a slump due to the economic downturn. 10. Rebound (verb) - to recover or bounce back after a decline ex) After a period of recession, the economy rebounded with strong growth. 11. **Peak** (noun) - the highest point or level ex) The chart shows that sales reached their peak during the holiday season. 12. **Downturn** (noun) - a period of decline or decrease in economic activity ex) The industry experienced a downturn due to changes in consumer preferences. 13. Accelerate (verb) - to increase in speed or rate ex) The company's expansion plans accelerated after securing additional funding. 14. Slow down (phrasal verb) - to decrease in speed or rate ex) The production rate **slowed down** due to a shortage of raw materials. 15. Flattening curve (idiom) - a gradual reduction or stabilization of a trend ex) The chart indicates a **flattening curve** in COVID-19 cases, suggesting a decrease in infection rates. 16. **Break-even point** (noun) - the point at which total costs equal total revenue The business needs to reach the break-even point to start making a profit. **Double-digit growth** (idiom) - a growth rate of more than 10% 17. ex) The company achieved double-digit growth in sales for the third consecutive quarter. 18. Taper off (phrasal verb) - to gradually decrease or diminish ex) The demand for the product tapered off after the initial launch hype.
 - 19. Upswing (noun) an upward or positive trendex) The market experienced an upswing as consumer confidence improved.
 - Hit a plateau (idiom) to reach a point of stability or little change
 The number of subscribers hit a plateau and remained steady for several months.
